Coronavirus

May I ask parents to exercise prudence and heed government advice when considering holidays abroad at half term, or indeed Christmas? The government advice for educational settings about travelling during the Coronavirus pandemic was updated this week and clearly states: The FCO (Foreign and Commonwealth Office) is advising British nationals against non-essential international travel for an indefinite period.

A period of self-isolation is now required when returning from many overseas countries. The list of countries can change at very short notice, as you will be aware. Please be alert to the possible ramifications of foreign travel. If you return from a country where restrictions require self-isolation, your child will not be able to return to school until the isolation period is over.

Thank you very much for all you are doing to support the measures we are taking in school to reduce the risk of transmission. Your good humour, flexibility and understanding are much appreciated and have certainly ensured that the children come into school in a relaxed and eager manner. At school we are constantly balancing the provision of education with ensuring the safety of pupils, families and staff.

Handwashing in school six times a day, with soap and water or sanitiser, does absorb a considerable amount of time and at present this means that our squeezed timetable does not include Spanish. We have not abandoned our love of languages and are looking at how best we can re-introduce Spanish next Half Term. Also, following our consultation with parents, teachers and pupils we have been able to plan the best provision for pupils, should an entire class have to go into lockdown. Were this to be necessary, you will be informed by email and at that point sent all the information you will need for remote learning to kick in for your child. If an individual child is having to self-isolate, work will be sent home.

It is the government's stated intention that schools would only close as a very last resort, but we are prepared, should such an eventuality occur.

I realise how much of a strain it can be for families at this difficult time and hope it is reassuring for you to know how comprehensively we are considering all COVID-related matters at school.
