















Year 3 Rubies

- The essence of World War 1 Day still lingers and the thoughts of poppies swaying on the battlefields stay with me.
- ❖ World War 1 day really brought what we were learning to life. As I sat and remembered those who lost their lives so that we could live in peace, I wondered what life would be like now if soldiers hadn't stood up to the enemy.
- ❖ World War 1 day was a fun and informative day with plenty of activities to do.

World War I dinner....



- ❖ From the looks of the spam, I thought it would taste disgusting, but when it was cooked it actually tasted amazing (in my opinion).
- ❖ In my opinion I would have totally hated having to eat that every day, but if it was all we had, then I would have had to just live with it.
- ❖ When I made the World War 1 lunch, I realised how little the soldiers had to eat and yet they had to fight every day. I also thought how horrible SPAM was.

Bivouac making:



- ❖ The building of the shelter was fun to do: being creative and figuring out what goes where. Mine was very comfortable because I added blankets and pillows but in an army trench it would not have been that way. I don't think I would have been able to put up with it.
- ❖ I enjoyed lying under the tarpaulin but only because we lay on a picnic rug .If I had been a soldier it would be much colder and muddy. I wouldn't have liked to sleep in the bivouac because it was very draughty.

Marching:



- ❖ I don't at all think that I could march like that with a straight back, in line, and in time for fifteen miles a day, as I would get really tired and want to fidget about, not doing these walks again and again.
- ❖ When I went outside to march around the garden I pictured myself in a vast and muddy field, drenched in water and with a surprise enemy attack, bullets scattering down on me like a deadly shower of rain.
- Striding up and down hills and flats made me feel like I was necessary in important events. Marching is harder than walking normally, it strengthens concentration but tires me out much faster.
- ❖ When I was marching I felt more important, but I only went a few laps of my garden and I could not have gone for 15 miles a day.

- ❖ I now have a different view of WW1 than I did before because I learnt so much from it. So many men were persuaded to join the army and then boom their life was taken away. A lot of families lost a member. I have experienced this and know it is awful.
- ❖ Another thing that I enjoyed was recreating Flanders Field. I did this by making a poppy and 'planting' it in my garden. I felt like this was more effective than just doing a two minutes silence because you could really have the peace and time to think about the consequences of war and the people that sacrificed their lives for us.
- Making the poppy made me feel emotional because it made me feel sorry for all the soldiers who risked their lives for their country.

Going over the top



- ❖ The most memorable experience from WW1 day was getting together with my friends to go 'over the top'. I enjoyed the variety of different activities but this stood out to me because it reminded me of how young some of the soldiers that fought were and that friendships and bonds played a massive part in WW1.
- ❖ It was a very nerve wracking experience as the whistle blew and we were required to charge over the steep hill into No Man's land. It would have been even more worrying if it could have been our last time doing it and that our own officers might shoot us in the back. The soldiers must have been petrified.
- ❖ The trepidation must have been immense for the soldiers on their ladders waiting for the whistle to blow, because I even felt anticipation going through me as I waited for my mum to blow the plastic pink whistle I had found at the bottom of my cupboard.

Not long now, until we are all back in school!
